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Profile:

Headquartered at New Delhi, the Asian Library Association (ASIALA) has been formed to play an important role in the promotion of librarianship as a profession vital to an informed and knowledgeable society and put emphasis on the professional development of LIS community through advocacy, peer networking, and leadership development through many initiatives.

It aims to provide professional leadership and coordination and work in strategic areas of the profession to further the library profession, library institutions and library and information services and to help library fraternity to engage in actions which develop group consciousness and respond to the public interest in ways which achieve socially and professionally desirable goals

It is registered under Societies Registration Act XXI of 1860 Vide Reg. No. S/R/S/SW/0890/2013.

The specific aims and objectives of ASIALA are as under:

- To provide the organizational framework in which to discuss future plans, organize committee activities, promote library studies and surveys, encourage the development of new tools, issue the resulting publications, lobby for legislative support, and hold conferences, workshops, and institutes necessary for substantial accomplishment.
- To help library fraternity to engage in actions which develop group consciousness and respond to the public interest in ways which achieve socially and professionally desirable goals
- To be representative and credible, hospitable to a growing diversity of interests and specializations of library professionals

Professional Activities:

Since its inception in year 2013, ASIALA has been undertaking professional activities in the form of organising discussions, invited talks, panel discussion, seminar, conferences and bringing out publications. A brief description of its activities is described below.

Seminar on E-books Day



ASIALA Organized E-books day on 9th June 2014 at University of Delhi South Campus in association with Proquest which was attended by nearly 125 library professionals from across the country.

One Day Seminar on E-Resource Management:

Organized one day seminar on “E-Resource Management” Changes & Challenges” on 11th October 2014 in collaboration with United Nation Information Center for India and Nepal at UN Convention Hall, 55 Lodi Estate, New Delhi.



The seminar was aimed at addressing related issues/questions: Is e-resource management the biggest challenge for libraries? What system and tools can be used to streamline e-resources? What kind of challenges are new e-formats posing? How do libraries realign workflows to find solutions to problems encountered in acquiring e-resources from the market? What can we achieve through more thoughtful licensing? How can sharing of standards and best practices be helpful in managing e-resources efficiently? At the inaugural session, UNIC National Information Officer Rajiv Chandran welcomed the participants – more than 100 library and information professionals from government, universities, academic & research institutions and NGOs. Labelling librarians as the neurons of the new information eco-system, he observed that our education system must now play an important role in creating opportunities for learning the best computer search techniques & formats that are to be used by users to frame relevant questions and to get relevant answers. Dr. S.S. Dhaka, President, ASIALA, introduced the charter of proposed ASIALA activities. Mr. Rob Rucker, Head of the Research & Inf. Services, North Carolina State University, USA, gave a special

presentation on a theme 'Helping Your Users Use Your E-Resources Over Chat: Anytime, Anywhere. The Inaugural Address UNIC Seminar on Managing E-Resources Photos: UNIC/K. Manoharan e-connect was delivered by Dr. R.K. Chadha, Additional Secretary, Lok Sabha Secretariat who highlighted the multi- dimensional challenges that e-resources and outreach posed to the library profession. In his Chief Guest's address, Prof. Mohammad Aslam, Vice-Chancellor of the Indira Gandhi National Open University (IGNOU) emphasized the need for libraries to play a more visible role in answering the complex information needs of present society through e-Resources and through using the latest technologies. He said that each library e-connect should craft a clear vision and mission statement on the use of e-technology in information. Three technical sessions followed: E-Resources Management: A Complex Paradigm; E-Resources Management: Issues and Challenges; E Resources: Sharing of Experiences/Case Studies followed by a panel discussion on P to E: The Transitional Changes. The first technical session on E-Resources Management: A Complex Paradigm was chaired by UNIC Librarian Dr. R.K. Sharma. In opening remarks Dr. Sharma said that the user attitude to information is gradually shifting from print documents to e- resources. E-resources also have a pragmatic value in teaching, learning and research. Plus, there are challenging issues for managing e-access. Five expert speakers – Mr. William Middleton, Information Resource Officer, American Center Library, Dr. S. Majumdar, Librarian, India International Centre, Dr. P.R. Goswami, Director, India Gandhi National Centre for the Arts, Librarian, Indraprastha University, Dr. P.G. Dastidar, Scientist, Ministry of Earth Sciences, Mr. Saleem Anwar, Dy. Librarian, Delhi University and Ms. Sneh Lata Sharma, Librarian, Tata Consultancy Services who shared their hands-on experiences, presented case studies and also addressed other sensitive problems encountered by libraries in managing e-resources. Each session was followed by a lively discussion and an involved Q & A session. The seminar concluded with Mr. Tariq Ashraf, Dy. Librarian, DU South Campus delivering the closing remarks and distributing participation certificates.



Collaboration with ICLAM 2014: International Conference on “innovative Ideas, Technologies and Services”.



ASIALA collaborated with National Institute of Fashion Technology New Delhi for holding a three day international conference ICLAM 2014 International Conference on the Convergence of Libraries, Archives and Museums (ICLAM) in New Delhi from 27th to 29th November, 2014. ICLAM 2014 held at IGNCA, New Delhi, India. The theme of the conference was “Innovative Ideas, Technologies and Services



ICLAM 2014 aimed to foster a spirit of innovation among all the professionals of the knowledge sector in order to attain the goal of long-term preservation of the collective memory of mankind. In the 21st century the core issue in memory institutions, i.e., libraries, archives and museums, is an innovative application of digital technologies in all the spheres

of activities ranging from management to collaboration. Technological innovation is vital to reinforce the roles of libraries, archives and museums in promotion of formal and informal learning. However, innovations internal or external, radical or incremental are not limited to applications of technologies. Critical changes are taking place in paradigms and products in libraries, archives and museums. Thus analyses of transformative influences of new organizational formations, processes, services, etc. are also significant. On the basis of deliberations on various aspects of innovation the conference suggested effective strategies for creating sustainable culture of innovation in institutions managing scientific and cultural heritage resources.

**ASIALA 2015 One Day Seminar on
“Acquisition of E-Resources in Academic Libraries”**



ASIALA-2015, the annual seminar of the Asian Library Association was held on theme, “Managing Libraries and Learning Resources: Repositioning libraries in virtual era” on May 16, 2015 at Delhi Technological University, Delhi, India.

The conference was aimed at addressing issues as how knowledge and resources can be managed in the changing virtual era? The conference was marked by lively talks, passionate presentations and subtle arguments and counter arguments. Senior and young stalwarts from the field of library and information science grappled with issues and offered wide ranging opinions and views. It witnessed Inaugural session, 4 technical sessions and a Valedictory. There were over 100 participants, 18 Invited Speakers, 5 Participant Speakers and 3 product presentations from different parts of the country.

Dr. Tariq Ashraf, Treasurer, ASIALA and Librarian, South Campus, University of Delhi conducted the proceedings of the day and Dr. Lalita Kumar, Assistant Librarian at DTU was the Local Coordinator.

The Conference started with the welcome of the dignitaries and their felicitation. At the Inaugural Session, Librarian, DTU and Conference Director, Dr. R K Shukla welcomed the delegates, Resource Persons and other Guests. Dr. S.S. Dhaka, President, ASIALA addressed the gathering and introduced the mission and objectives of the association. Ms. Kirsty Crawford, Director, Library & Digital Information Services, British Council, India graced the occasion as Chief Guest and gave a special presentation on how British Council progressed in various parts of India and the services provided by them. She also focused on how libraries can interact with its users through mobile apps, which was appreciated by one and all. The Key Note Address was delivered by Prof. P B Mangla, Eminent Professor & Tagore National

Fellow, who described the librarian as a knowledge resource manager. He further said that librarians should adopt new competencies to overcome the change. In his Thematic Address, Dr. D V Singh, University Librarian, University of Delhi talked about the explosion of information. He also emphasized that the librarians are innovators who can bring the change in the society. Prof. A. Trevedi delivered the presidential address and spoke on how in great old days knowledge was preserved and how knowledge helps in providing the solution to a problem. Dr. Rajesh Bhardwaj, Librarian, FORE School of Management and Organizing Secretary of this event proposed the Vote of Thanks.

The 1st technical session on “Organizational Strategies and Resource Development” was chaired by Dr. Shailandra Kumar HOD, DLIS, University of Delhi. In his opening remarks, Dr. Shailandra talked about organizational strategies needed to manage the resources. There was one product presentation by Emerald Publishing Group and three Invited presentations delivered by Dr. Sangeeta Kaul on “Knowledge Services”, Dr. Narender Kumar on “Barriers in Accessing Electronic Resources” and by Dr. Raj Kumar Bhardwaj on “Online Legal Information System”.

The 2nd technical session on “Collaboration for Knowledge & Learning Resources” was chaired by Dr. R.K. Sharma, Librarian, UN Information Centre for India and Bhutan. There was one product presentation by Balani InfoTech on Turnitin and two Invited Talks by Dr. P K Upadhyay on “Libraries in Nation Building under Digital India Programme” and by Dr. Sanjay Kataria on “Acquisition of E-Resources in Academic Libraries”.



The post Lunch Session 3 on “Management of Knowledge & Learning Resources” was chaired by Dr. Narender Kumar of the University of Delhi. The session featured one product presentation by Mr. Rohan Bhardwaj of M/S Ignitor, eText Book aggregator and both Invited as well as Participant presentations. Dr. Priya Rai delivered very useful talk on “Commonwealth Professional Fellowship” which generated lot of interest in the young professionals. Invited participant presentations were delivered by Ms. Vanita Khanchandani, Mr. Hirdyesh Kumar Singh and Mr. Nanda Lal Manik in the areas of E-Learning, Library outreach programs and copyrights issues. These young professionals were outstanding in their deliberations making excellent use of audio-visuals.

The 4th and last technical session on, “Advance Technologies, Tools & Trends in Libraries” was chaired by Dr. Rajesh Bhardwaj. There was one Invited presentation by Dr. Projesh Rai on “Application of RFID and NFC in LICs. Three participant presentations were delivered by young enthusiast professionals in the areas of Marketing of LIS Products and services, mobile apps to access e-resources and application of mobile technology on users and libraries. These speakers were Ms. Pinky, Ms. Ruchi and Ms.Monika.

The Valedictory session was chaired by Prof. R.K. Sinha, Dean, DTU and presided over by Dr. Sanjeev Kumar, General Secretary and Director (NRC), NIFT. Dr. Nabi Hasan, Rapporteur General and Deputy Librarian, IIT Delhi presented the Report of the conference. Significant contributors to this event were felicitated and an open session was also organized for the feedback of the event. The conference ended with the following recommendations.

Recommendations: The recommendations made in the conference include;

- To develop guidelines for managing Knowledge and Learning Resources.
- To develop guidelines for interoperability and sustainability of institutional repositories to develop interdisciplinary and cross campus research.
- Each institute should prepare statistics regarding usage of e-resources by their users.
- In order to optimize use of e-resources, training and awareness programmes ought to be organized by libraries on regular basis.
- Web 2.0/3.0 tools ought to be exploited by LIS professionals for optimum utilization of e-resources,
- Mobile Apps should be explored for increasing the usage of the e-resources.
- The Government should allocate sufficient funds to libraries to acquire the latest

information resources and upgrade their ICT equipments and facilities.

- LIS Professionals must consider the economic and environmental sustainability in management of e-resources.
- Collection development policies should be revamped on the basis of utilization of e-resources among users.

**International Conference on Digital Governance Innovation, Information and Libraries
Organised Jointly by Asian Library Association and IIM Indore at the Indian Institute
of Management Indore**

April 14-16, 2016



Context & Purpose of the Conference

The objective of the conference was to explore libraries as a broad foundation for interaction with information and information management in a digital world in furtherance of Digital India vision. The conference aimed to delve into the issue of Digital Libraries with a focus that supported not only information seeking and discovery but also community interaction and collaboration.

The conference engaged the participants in a discussion of critical issues faced by practitioners managing library resources, functions and services in the light of Digital India Programme of the Government of India. The format of conference was presentations by library professionals, invited talks by experts and debates on various sub-themes of the conference

Objectives of the Conference

The Conference provided a forum for discussion and exchange of ideas on the main theme as well as various subthemes. The main objectives of the conference were to:

- To deliberate on the issue of Digital Governance for positioning Libraries as its harbinger & facilitators;

- Understand the history and development of digital libraries as an international phenomenon in the context of e-governance, Democratisation and Citizen Empowerment;
- Establish a broad context issues and challenges facing digital libraries and their emerging role in social equity and inclusion;
- Specify the critical skills required to build and maintain digital libraries as resource centre for Digital India Programme;
- Discuss, debate and develop strategies to manage libraries of the future;
- Identify and disseminate experiences of library professionals from various geographies in meeting current transformational challenges faced by libraries and develop strategies to address them;

Summary

The conference was well attended by around 185 participants and around 150 Research papers were received for publications. However, only 78 papers were accepted for the publication in the conference proceeding, out of which 63 papers were selected for presentation out of which 55 papers were presented that is 90% of the authors presented the papers. There were 9 technical sessions covering the paper presentations, 6 keynote addresses delivered on key issues and 2 debates on contemporary issues well debated by learned panelist. Also 6 publishers/vendors made presentations on their products and services.

Detailed Report

Workshop: Paper Development and Publishing in an Electronic world

Dr. Akhtar Pervez, Organising Secretary welcomed the gathering and indicated the reasons for organizing the workshop on Paper Development and Publishing in an Electronic world. Papers submitted for conference were incomplete in terms of content, reference, in-text citation; hence the Organising Committee suggested having workshop on the above to enhance the writing ability of the authors. Dr. Parvez shared his views on the available research tools for organizing references and improving the language.

Professor Srinath Jagannathan, Faculty, IIM Indore conducted the workshop with live examples, particularly for qualitative research. It was very interactive and interesting workshop. He also explained how to use the DICTION 7 software for the qualitative

research.



Inauguration

The conference was inaugurated by Professor Rishiksha T. Krishnan, Director, IIM Indore and advised, libraries should transform to meet the expectation of end users and he further

emphasized the challenges faced by the librarians to bring the younger generation into the



library and proposed that libraries have to become hub of activities and a locus to discuss

ideas.

Dr. Akhtar Parvez, in his opening remarks thanked the Asian Library Association for collaborating with IIM Indore and also thanked the Director, IIM Indore for the support extended by IIM Indore in hosting of the conference. He also expressed his gratitude to all the delegates for having come to IIM Indore and the sponsors for their generous support.

Dr. S.S Dhaka, President, ASIALA spoke about the role of Asian Library Association and its objectives for promoting the LIS community in the Asian countries. Dr. Ranjeet Nambudiri, Chief Conference Advisor highlighted the issues relating to licensing, shrinking library budgets, service tax, unauthorized access, and procurement.

On the occasion, the conference proceeding was also released by the Director, IIM Indore.



A formal vote of thanks was extended by Col. K.T. Udupa, Chairman, Organizing Committee of the conference.

Keynote Addresses

1. Ms. Chris Flegg, Librarian, Said Business School, University of Oxford



The First Technical session began with the keynote address by Ms. Chris Flegg. In her keynote address, on the topic ‘Decision Making in an Age of Uncertainty’, she explained the role of the frontline staff as libraries depend on them for success to a great extent. In her address, she discussed about many leadership theories that had evolved over a period of time



and how the definition of a leader's role and leader's function have constantly evolved. She also pointed out the importance of the roles and responsibilities of the managers vs leaders vs staff. She also gave insights into 'Scenario planning' concept for decision making. She pointed out that we need to redefine our strategy for new business model with Staff + Skills



as assets which enable the tasks. There were many interesting questions raised which added more insight to the talk.

2. Key Issues in Effective Communications by Professor Madhusri Shrivastava, Faculty,

IIM Indore

Professor Madhusri Shirvatsava delivered the 2nd keynote address of the conference on “Issues in effective communications”. Her talk was very motivating and interesting. She began her talk with the general image of the librarian in the community. She advised librarians to be more proactive and delegate works to subordinate/staff with trust. She also highlighted the significance of seeking and giving feedback. The session raised many curious questions which were well attended by the speaker.



3. Information Literacy and trans-literacy in the Digital Context by Dr. Swati Bhattacharya, Librarian, IIM Calcutta.

Dr. Swati Bhattacharya delivered the 3rd keynote address on the topic “Information Literacy and trans-literacy in the Digital Context”. While sharing her experience of working with Agricultural Portals of Maharashtra Government as part of e-Choupal project, she said that it was not only important to make the information available digitally online but also it is important that we provide information literacy to the citizens. Dr. Swati felt that we need to create a network society of government, citizens and institutions for participative citizenship. She said that technology alone can’t solve the problem and emphasized on how public libraries with the support of academic libraries can get trained on information literacy skills

and thereby help the citizens to use information that triggers response and action and helps them take more informed decisions. She also said that Information Literacy is not alone computer literacy but it is a habit of mind to recognize the need of information, analyze, knowing who can provide the information, cooperate with each other/ group capability and use it to solve a problem. Her session was well received by the audience.



4. Library Standards and Protocol by Dr. Saiful Amin, Director, Semantic Consulting & Visiting faculty, DRTC, Bangalore.

Dr. Saiful Amin, Director, Semantic Consulting & Visiting faculty, DRTC, Bangalore delivered very informative keynote address on 'Library Standards and Protocol'. He emphasized on the importance of standards and protocols in order to sustain in the long run for digital libraries and also elaborated the details of the standards to be used for the physical collection and online resources. He also presented cases of Creating Union catalogues and cluster OPAC.

5. Information Ethics in Digital Environment by Dr. Medha Joshi, Head, Department of Library Science, Tata Memorial Hospital, Mumbai.

Dr. Medha Joshi, Head, Department of Library Science, Tata Memorial Hospital, Mumbai delivered

the 5th keynote address of the Conference on 'Information Ethics in Digital Environment'. Dr. Joshi started by explaining the importance of ethical review of research protocols by institutional ethics committees and felt the same ethical aspects are applied to





digital libraries & its information services areas. Tracing the beginning of Information Ethics to 1988, she emphasized that information in digital world is easily accessible, and therefore there is need to look in to the ethical use of Information. She then elaborated the 4 principles on clinical research Ethics, and related them to the various aspects of information, of which

privacy, confidentiality and selection and provision of unbiased Information were most important. She cited several practical situations and examples where ethical dilemmas are prominent. She summarized that there is a need for developing guidelines for Information ethics. However, often the information ethical issue may have to be resolved on case to case basis.

6. Researching Information for Smart Cities and Global Outsourcing Management Projects
by Dr. Jay Bhatt, Librarian, and Dr. Samir Shah, Associate Clinical Professor, Drexel
University, Philadelphia, USA

Dr. Jay Bhatt, Librarian, and Dr. Samir Shah, Associate Clinical Professor in Management Information System Drexel University, Philadelphia delivered the 5th keynote address of the Conference. The session was carried out through video conferencing.





Dr. Samir Shah, gave a brief overview of the Drexel University Community and about the Co-op a crash course in real life and its impact in career decisions of the students. He explained the Global Classroom collaboration project where students of Drexel University are working in collaboration with other major universities of the world, getting to work with multidisciplinary and multicultural aspects, solving real world business problems with the purpose of Global Skill development. Dr. Jay Bhatt, showed the different subject guides and its various components he had designed specifically for Smart Cities at Drexel Libraries. He also explained the Connections theme he used to collaborate with the users for connecting scholarship across. He explained in detail about the services that he had built for this project on Smart Cities and gave some useful tips to build such subject/topic specific guides for the students. The session was interactive and Dr. Jay helped by answering the queries precisely. The video conference session was coordinated by Dr. Akhtar Parvez.



Debates

1. Have the Library Consortia Brought Value to small Institutions

A debate on “Have the Library Consortia Brought Value to small Institutions?” was organized on the 2nd day of the Conference. The panelists included Dr. Yoginder Singh, Librarian, IIT Roorke; Dr. Swati Bhattacharya, Librarian, IIM Calcutta; Mr. Vivek Mehra, Managing Director, Sage Publishing; Dr. R.K Chaddha, Additional Secretary, Parliament Library; Dr. Medha Joshi, HoD, Dept. of Library Science, Tata Memorial Hospital, Mumbai & Dr Daulat Jotwani, Librarian, Amity University. The debate created heated arguments among the panelists who spoke for and against the library consortia. Strong arguments were put forward by both the groups in favour and against the consortia and its impact on small institutions. It was very well moderated by Dr. S. Venkadesan, Library Director, ISB, Hyderabad and made the panel discussion like a live trial court. The participants also actively participated in the QA session.



2. Can Libraries Ever Beat Google?

Ms. Chris Fleggs, University of Oxford; Dr. Swati Bhattacharya, IIM Calcutta; Dr. P.R. Goswami, Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts, New Delhi argued that Google can't beat libraries. Whereas Dr. Venkadesan, ISB Hyderabad; Mr. M.K. Chettiar, Bharat Book Bureau, Mumbai, Dr. Sanjeev Kumar, NIFT, New Delhi and Dr. Chaddha equally argued that Google will easily beat libraries.

Though both the sides put up strong arguments during the discussion, it was well moderated by Dr. Tariq Ashraf and he pointed out that librarians have to change and re-strategize and repurpose the services to match the services of Google. As usual, the participants cornered the panelist with valid questions.

Paper Presentations

1. Sub-theme: Digital Governance

Seven papers were presented by the authors in the first technical session which was chaired by Dr. Sanjeev Kumar, Director (Library) NIFT, New Delhi and Dr. Dhavalben, D. Bhatt, Chief Librarian, Parul University, Vadodara. Dr. Kuljeet Gill, Librarian, Guru Nanak Institute of Management Studies, Mumbai supported the session as rapporteur. The theme of the session was “Digital Governance” and the papers mainly dealt with efforts made by the librarians on digital governance at the institute level and also their participation and role in implementing Digital Governance and E-governance initiatives in the country. The deliberation also focused on security issues, operational monopolies of E-business and also on factors for deriving public value of these initiatives.



2. Digital Libraries/Developing Digital Culture Collections

The session was chaired by Dr. S.S. Dhaka, Library Director, Ministry of External Affairs and Ms. Jyoti Bhatt, of M.S. University, Baroda. The session witnessed four paper presentations on the theme “Digital Libraries/ Developing Digital Culture Collections” discussing on topics of new models for optimized image retrieval in Digital Libraries to experiential learning and understanding on Digital Deluge and confirming that library as a space still holds importance to computerization of school library.



3. Digital Libraries/Developing Digital Culture Collections

The session was chaired by Dr. Narendra Kumar, Deputy Librarian, University of Delhi and Dr. Shiva Kanaujia Sukula, Deputy Librarian, Jawaharlal Nehru University.



During this session, seven papers were presented on the theme “Digital Resources preservation management and cultivation/ Indian manuscripts and Digital Projects for Heritage preservation/ IPR copyright in the digital age/ Information ethics, privacy, security/ Networking and Consortia in Digital Learning Environment”. Interesting case studies on Digitization of Manuscripts in Indore, Rajasthan and efforts made at national level in this context were highlighted. Importance of networking, consortia in Digital Learning environment and aspects of RTI Act vs Privacy laws was well debated.

4. Information literacy and Trans-literacy in the Digital Context

This session was chaired by Dr. Rajeev Vij, Additional Director, DESIDOC, DRDO, New Delhi and Dr. Vikram Kumar, Librarian, Manav Rachna International University, Faridabad. There were 4 papers presented on the theme “Information literacy and Trans-literacy in the Digital Context”. The papers mainly focused on the best practices of information literacy in

academic libraries for the students, research scholars and also the librarians as self-directed learning and its impact on the use of library resources.



5. Open access movement and ICT enabled technologies

The 5th session was chaired by Dr. P.R. Goswami, Library Director, Indira Gandhi National Centre for the Arts, New Delhi and Dr. R. K. Verma, former Scientist, NISCAIR.. There were 4 papers presented during the session on the theme “Open access movement and ICT enabled technologies”. The papers mainly dealt with KOHA and other FOSS for various digital library related activities and also the publication trends in open access journals followed by case study on use of ICT by management institutes of Maharashtra in teaching, learning and research purpose.



6. Extensible Digital Library Service Platform

The session was chaired by Professor S. Kumar (Retd), Vikram University, Ujjain and Mr. J.K. Patnaik, Librarian, RRCAT, Indore. Dr. Leena Shah, Librarian, Govt. Kalidas Girls College, Ujjain is a Rapporteur of the session.

Six papers were presented during the session on the theme “Extensible Digital Library

service platform”. The papers discussed on concepts of Research Commons, Innovation in Business school libraries, use of internet in management colleges, application of QR code for modernizing the services in the libraries along with usage study of INDEST-AICTE consortium in a Institute.



7. User satisfaction and behavior in Digital age

The session was chaired by Mr. Mustahsan Usmani Raja, Deputy Librarian, IIM Lucknow and Dr. Kishore John, Associate Professor (LISc), OSD, Additional Director, Higher Education, Indore.

In this session eight papers were presented on the theme “User satisfaction and behavior in Digital age”. The papers were focused on managing user expectations in Google era and assessing the usage of library physical and e-resources and understanding the difficulties and attitudes and the users satisfaction levels about the services rendered by the library in the digital age.



8. Marketing of Library Services in Digital Age/Knowledge Management: Digital Content

This session was chaired by Dr. Swati Bhattacharya, Librarian, IIM Calcutta and Ms. Saira

Qureshi, Librarian, The Daly College. Mr. Khalid Nadeem Khan, Assistant Librarian, Jamia Millia Islamia acted as the Rapporteur.

There were five papers presented in this session on the theme “Marketing of Library Services in Digital age/ Knowledge management: digital content”. The papers focused on the aspect of marketing library services using evolving social media tools and using Gamification theory in making library services interesting and also on knowledge management services and tools used in the corporate scenario.



9. Other Papers

The session was chaired by Dr. R.K. Sharma, Librarian, United Nations Information Centre, New Delhi and Professor Bulu Maharana, Sambalpur University, Orissa. There were nine papers were presented on different topics focusing on licensing and subscription issues of e-resources, webometrics studies, use of technologies in the library and the status of librarians in different types of libraries.

Technical Sessions – II

Chaired by Dr. Jaideep Sharma currently working as University librarian of IGNOU, followed by Plenary Talk Dr. P.R. Goswami Director, Library and Information IGNOU, New Delhi. There are six contributed papers delivered by Vinod Kumar Singh/ Amit Kumar, Assistant Professor : Wiki for Libraries and Librarians: A Collaborative Approach followed by Mangat Ram, Librarian/ Seema Rani, Librarian delivered his paper on ‘Information Literacy Initiatives and Models’ followed by Dr. Shehbaz Husain Naqvi delivered his paper on ‘Library Consortia in India’ followed by Imran Khan delivered his paper on ‘Challenges and Opportunities of Collection Development in Digital Libraries’ and lastly in this technical session delivered her paper by Neetika Sharma on ‘ICT: A Mechanism for Supporting Agricultural and Rural Development’



The technical session 2 was followed by a highly interactive panel discussion. Titled Future of Academic Libraries: Need for Transformation

The panelists included Dr. Suresh Jindal, Dr. Jaideep Sharma, Dr. Sudhir Arora, Dr. Sanjay Kataria, Dr. Puja Anand Gulati. The debate created heated arguments among the panelists

Technical Sessions – III

Chaired by Dr. Dr. R. K. Sharma Librarian UNIC New Delhi, and was followed by Plenary Talk Dr. (Mrs.) Usha Munjoo Munshi, Librarian Indian Institute Of Public Administration New Delhi Who spoke on several new areas into which libraries can diversify.

The talk was followed by four contributed papers which included Mr. Ramesh Yernagula paper on ‘Design and Development of Digital Repository at the Indian Council of Historical Research’

, Mr. Rahul Kumar Singh and Mr. Rajesh Singh on ‘Open Access E-resources for Academic Libraries’ Mr. Habib –Ur-Rehman Khan on ‘Use of e-resources by the students and faculty members of Babasaheb Bhimrao Ambedkar University, Lucknow: A Study’. The last paper was presented on Barriers to Access to E-resources by Dr. Narendar Kumar of Delhi University dwelling on the bottlenecks to vital resources.

Technical Sessions – IV

Dr. S. Majumdar chief librarian IIC, New Delhi chaired the last technical session of the 2 day conference, followed by Invited Talk Dr. Tariq Ashraf , who spoke on the need for transforming libraries through innovation, valued additions and re-purposing to meet the challenge from massive online contents.



His talk was followed by followed by a paper presentation by Dr. Rittu Sethi delivered on 'Cloud Computing: in context of Five Laws of Library Science' followed Ms. Sunita Vyas on 'Libraries as Social Spaces for Skill training'

The post lunch session of the conference began with the invited talk Dr. Shantanu Ganguly who painstakingly elaborated as to how libraries can be converted into info entrepreneurship through incubation and project writing.

The last part of the day was taken over by a very power packed and varied panel discussion on "Growing Digital Footprints and need for transformation. 2nd International Conference of Asian Libraries ICAL 2017
Expanding Digital Footprints: Role of Libraries & Information Centres
October 26 to 28, 2017

1. Introduction

2nd International Conference of Asian Libraries organized by Jamia Millia Islamia and Asian Library Association during October 26 to 28, 2017. The inaugural session began with recitation of the sacred texts by a staff of JMI. The serene and stimulating environment fostered an unleashing of intellectual creativity, debate and discussions during the three days conference. The well attended event sourced together nearly 250 delegates and experts ranging from all types of libraries. ICAL 2017 also witnessed the participants from SAARC countries namely Sri Lanka and Bangladesh and all most all states of the country. ICAL2017 is marked by lively talks, passionate presentations and subtle arguments and counter arguments. Stalwarts from the field of library and information science grappled with issues and offered wide ranging opinions and views. ICAL@2017 witnessed 8 brainstorming and mind blowing sessions, which include 8 invited talks and 65 presentations by the participants on varied areas related to the theme of conference. In addition, 3 panel discussions by well-known luminaries of library profession and publishing industry made it a special event. During the three days conference 2 workshops were also organized on Digitization and information literacy (One by British Library London and another by UNESCO). Besides this, during the industry connect sessions 14 presentations were made by professionals from industry.

2. Inaugural Session

Preceded by inaugural session, Dr. Hasan Jamal Abidi, University Librarian, Jamia Millia Islamia and Organizing Secretary of this conference welcomed the delegates. Dr. S.S.Dhaka, President, ASIALA addressed the gathering and introduced ASIALA and its objectives. Dr. Sanjay Kumar Bihani, Chair IFLA Regional Standing Committee on Asia and Oceania also developed the welcome address on the behalf of IFLA. The inaugural session was graced by Prof. Seyed Ehtesham Hasnain, Vice-chancellor of Jamia Hamdard University. Presidential Address was delivered by Prof. Talat Ahmad, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Jamia Millia Islamia. During the inauguration keynote address was delivered by Dr. Arun Kumar Chakraborty, DG, RRRLF, Kolkata. Session was concluded with vote of thanks by Dr. Tariq Ashraf,

Incharge, Delhi University South Campus. In the welcome address, Dr. Hasan Jamal Abidi, welcomed all dignitaries and delegates to the 2nd International Conference of Asian Libraries (ICAL1017). He then explained the significance of the conference theme “Expanding digital footprints: Role of libraries and information centres”. He opined that 90% digital data generated in the last two years’ time. Thus, we need to think how libraries and librarians cope up with exponential growth enormous data and publications. The conference thus sets a platform to discuss some of the pertaining issues impacting the libraries and information centres.

Then Dr. S.S. Dhaka took the floor. He informed the audience the professional roles played by the ASIALA, the organizer. ASIALA aims to promote professional development of LIS professionals and teachers, and skills development of the young students and early career professionals. In this direction, ASIALA organizes conference and other events in regular intervals. Dr. Sanjay K. Bihani, Chair of IFLA RSCAO, welcomed the delegates on behalf of RSCAO as a co-organizer of the event. He introduced activities of RSCAO in the Asian region. It is one of the largest sections of IFLA, catering to five sub-regions and member

institutions in 62 countries. He then presented a video message of IFLA President. She could not attend personally but wished the conference a great success. She then explained IFLA's Global Vision, which is tuned with the Sustainable Development Goals (SDGs). In his address chief guest Professor Seyed Ehtesham Hasnain, honourable VC of Jamia Hamdard, emphasized the reality of today's digital world, where a digital society is emerging. He said we live in the era of information revolution. The advanced countries such as USA and Germany are investing energy and resources in big data initiatives for churning out socio-economic benefits. He then explained transformation of data, information, and knowledge into wisdom. There we need to integrate them for the benefits of larger sections of the society.

After the address of the chief guest, the conference proceedings were released by all dignitaries on the dais. In his address guest of Honour Dr. Arun Kumar Chakraborty, DG of RRRLF Kolkata, stated that the indicator of a library's popularity is now measured by library's digital footfalls, which he calls as 'fingerfalls'. Many libraries in India, including the public libraries, are providing web-based e-services and they are also on the social media. He further explained if entire library collections cannot be digitized due to copyright restrictions, and limitations in OCR of Indian language contents, the metadata of every document should be available online through the library's website. He also pointed out to successful outreach services by some state central libraries (SCLs) in the country. The career guidance service in those SCLs is highly popular, benefitting thousands of youngsters and guiding them into sustainable future. Then the organizer moved to conferment of Lifetime Achievement Award on Professor Jamal Abdul Wajid, a noted scholar and academician. A citation and a shawl were presented to Professor Wajid by Professor Talat Ahmed, Honorable Vice Chancellor of JMI.

In his presidential address Professor Talat Ahmed, honourable VC of JMI, welcomed the delegates to JMI, the host university. He said, nice to see all of you in JMI. He urged the librarians to make the services more attractive and more useful. Before the digital revolution, we had tough time for getting copy of good articles, published in journals of the foreign publishers. That is no longer an issue. The standards of theses and academic research have to be improved significantly, as we have much better facilities and resources embracing the online platforms. Although the reading rooms are always full in air-conditioned environment in our university libraries, we need to enhance the usage of library's e-collections by the users

sitting in the reading halls. Then Professor Ahmed declared the ICAL2017 open. Prof. Talat Ahmad inaugurated the exhibition during ICAL@2017 after the inauguration session.



3. Technical Sessions

The conference has 6 technical sessions in three days period. First session was chaired by Prof. Shabhat Hussain and Key Note Speaker was Dr. B. Shadrach, Advisor, Indian Public Library Movement. The session was started with the plenary talk by Dr. B. Shadrach, Advisor, Indian Public Library Movement. Dr. Shadrach discussed about the governance which is a science and process to be used to govern. He also differentiated the government and governance.

He elaborated the efforts being made by the govt. to promote digital governance and gave examples of Umang and other digital initiative of the Indian Govt. He stressed upon the issues pertaining to privacy and security in this digital era, where everything is residing in clouds. He said that digital divide is again crucial where the contents are biased by languages. Most of the contents are in English which needs to be balanced by the inputs of the society. There were 7 contributed papers in that session. However, only 4 papers were presented. The first paper was entitled “Indian Cloud Computing Laws: An Analytical Study” by Mr. Ajit Kumar, Library and Information Association Officer, Nehru Memorial Museum and Library, New Delhi.

He described in details about definitions of Cloud Computing, different models of cloud computing. His main emphasis was on cloud computing laws especially in India. He described in details the issues like jurisdictional issues, security and data privacy, data protection, IPR etc. He briefed about different surveys which were carried out to map about cloud computing in India. He recommended that Indian Govt. should take some concrete steps to protect privacy; they should take membership of WIPO or other international organisation in this direction. The second paper of the session was presented by Ms. Manika Lamba on the title “Marketing of LIS Products and Services in select medical libraries of Delhi in digital environment: A comparative study”. She studied two main medical libraries namely National Medical Library (NML) and Indian Council of Medical Research (ICMR) library. She mentioned about the various resources and services being used by both the libraries. However, there was very limited usage of social media. She urged and suggested in her recommendation for more utilisation of social media and digital marketing tools. Third presentation was given by Dr. Anil Kumar Dhiman, Information Scientist, Gurukul Kangri University, Haridwar. He presented about meaning, advantages, pillars and delivery models of e-governance. The recent initiatives of e-governance were also discussed in his presentation like National e-Governance plan of different states in India. He further talked about role of social media in e-governance. He gave examples of Delhi Traffic Police, Kolkata Traffic Police and MCD. The last presentation of the session was given by Mr. Nahav Alam, Research Scholar, AMU on the title “A Bibliometric Study of Scientific Literature on Telecommunication from 2007-2017: He found that Asian countries were lacking behind in the publication of telecommunication sector. The 2nd session during the day was chaired by Dr. Samyukhta Ravi, University Librarian, Pondicherry University. During the session the invited talk was delivered by Dr. Geeta Malhotra, Read-India Foundation, Gurugram. Dr. Malhotra discussed various aspects of libraries and its importance. Nine papers were listed during the programme. However, only 7 papers were presented. The topics of the papers were institutional repositories, mobile learning, digitization and preservation; technology based learning, layered integration for digital preservation, big data and content management. The session was interactive and several questions were asked by the audience.

First session of the 2nd day was on theme Capacity Building & HR Management in Digital Age. The session was chaired by Prof. Naushad Ali P.M., AMU, Aligarh and Plenary Talk was delivered by Dr H K Kaul, Director-DELNET. The topic of his talk was “Challenges

from the information growth”. In his talk he discussed different challenges that evolve due to information growth in the context of libraries & library & Information professionals. He said that the information growth has created problem of having access to quality information. About 80% information available through Google or any other free search engine is useless and 20% information is of any academic use. The authentic and quality information is under control of commercial publishers such as Elsevier’s, Sage, etc. Though recently EBSCO Academic Online, etc are trying to provide such information freely, but it is the librarian who has to come forward for content control of scientific information. It will help the researchers to get the desired information easily. Another problem is that information generated now days is scattered. It is very difficult for the user to retrieve it. The students cannot filter the required information available in different sources and formats. It is the librarian who should help in this process. They can do it easily provided they are interested. And they have to be in order to survive in the academic environment. It will give librarians appreciations and larger usage to their library. It can be done by creating Library networks, Consortia etc where most of the information available is authentic and reliable. It is filtered before being disseminated. The content management is another challenge which is faced due to information growth. Now a days a lots of open source software for content management such as Joomla, Drupal, Wordpress etc. are available in the market. The librarians can use theses software for better management of their contents so that the user gets what he wants in filtered and most appropriate manner. Social Media is one of the emerging media through which librarians can disseminate information to the users. Since Social media is widely used by the students daily, it will be the right source of information dissemination. The use of social media and the future of them using in information dissemination gives expectation that one day, a post of Social Media Librarian will be created in an organization.



Big data can be used and manipulated both. It is the librarian who should be careful about their misuse. They should have expertise to stop the manipulation of the big data. In the scenario of information growth, Library should prefer to provide digital library services. This

will make the usage of the library more and users can get the exact information easily. There are some technological challenges that information growth pose to the librarians. The libraries should provide the knowledge centre applications to the industries, educational institutions, NGOs, workmen, etc. More use of recent storage methods like cloud computing, crowd sourcing, etc will help the librarian in better data storage and management. Although these technologies should be used with utmost care since they are prone to hacking, etc. Now-a-days to improve the image of the librarian and library both the library should provide tailored services to their users. They should have expertise to troubleshoot the technical problems that comes in the library. The chairperson summarized the plenary talk by saying that it is duty of library & information professionals and the faculty both to check the quality of the content of the information to be disseminated by the library and syllabus.

After the plenary talk the contributed papers were presented by different persons. Total six (06) papers were presented in this session. A brief overview of these is given below.

Papers I: Changing Attitude Of The Users In Using E-Resources Through Open Access: A Case Study Of Faculties Of School Of Social Sciences, Mizoram University presented by Esther Lalruatpuii & H Miriami. The presenters talked about the changing Attitude of the Users in Using E-Resources through Open Access. The data was taken from faculties of School of Social Sciences, Mizoram University. They concluded that use of open access resources are gaining momentum in Mizoram University. The faculties are using them form increasing their knowledge and publish academic papers. The researchers are also using these resources frequently in their academic work. 2nd Paper was on Research Output of Jamia Millia Islamia: A Bibliometric Study presented by Arun Ruhela & Garvita Jhamb. Another paper was presented on the bibliometric analysis of Research Output of Jamia Millia Islamia. The data from the Web of Science for the period 1994-2016 was downloaded from WoS for Jamia Millia Islamia. The analysis shows that 3913 records were retrieved from databases. Maximum papers were in year 2016. Different paramant from the data was presented. Paper III: Digital Resources of Institut Français de Pondichéry (IFP) presented Narenthiran. R. In this paper Digital Resources available in Institut Français de Pondichéry was briefly described by the presenter. He gives different programmes that run in the institute for digitization of manuscripts. Fourth paper was on Organization and Management of Multimedia Resources in Libraries presented by Ms. Manju. The paper covers different types of multimedia resources available in different libraries. The method of their preservation, organization for posterity

was discussed. Paper V: Plagiarism in Academics: An Ethical Dilemma presented by Nushrat Parween The presenter discussed about plagiarism in academics. What is called plagiarism, different types of plagiarism and how to prevent plagiarism. Paper 6th discussed the Information Literacy Skills of Faculty Members of Aligarh Muslim University, Aligarh: A Survey/Dr. Haleema Khatoon. The last presenter gives analysis of Information Literacy Skills of Faculty Members of Aligarh Muslim University. She talks about the need of information skills required by the users. In her study it was found that users are not so comfortably with IT infrastructure. There is a need to give training, organize orientations so that they learn the skills required in the use of IT in retrieving the required information.



The chairperson concluded with the remark that the library & information professionals should work for content management in a better way. They should use different technologies for content filtration, dissemination and storage. It will give them appreciations for users and the library usage will improve to a great extent.

In the second day of conference 2nd session was chaired by Prof. Mustafa Zaidi and key Note Speaker of the session was Dr. Shahid Rasool the Director of Commonwealth of Learning. The rapporteur of the session was Dr. S. M. Abbas. In this session there was one invited talk, two talks from industries and three papers presented. Key Note speaker introduced about

CEMCA (Commonwealth Education Media Centre for Asia. He viewed that we talked about Knowledge society, knowledge economy and now knowledge per-capita and importance of learning of T.V. He also presented that world has become flat. Due to Technological advances most of the new developed technologies are available for all. You Tube is the largest search engine by which we are getting the information. The electronic industries like Sage and ProQuest viewed that as publishers we are ready to cope with changes taking place in the 21st century. He presented his products about Adam Matthew, which publishes unique primary source collections from archives around the world and Sage Research Methods: search and browse books, dictionaries, encyclopedia, video, journal articles, cases and datasets on research methods to help you learn and conduct projects. The ProQuest representative represented the products and viewed about Content, Digitisation, E-books and Technology. It is empowering libraries through digitization. ProQuest empowers academic, government, corporate, school, and public libraries with innovative content and technologies, as well as services that enable strategic acquisition, management, and discovery of information collections.

The paper presented “Literacy Skills among the Research Scholars in Mizoram University and North Eastern Hill University: A Study” by Vanlalncia and Prof. R. N. Mishra. The survey was conducted and concluded that most of the researchers are in use of internet. they also using the information technology for their researches. Electronic and Print Documents used in the Geo- Physic Thesis Awarded in Kurushetra University, Kurushetra: A Study of Shodhganga Repository by Suresh Kumar and Shanker. The study analysed five thesis of Geo- Physics shows that most cited documents were from journals and remaining citation were from books, conference proceedings theses and others. Degree of information Literacy Skills of Users at Mizoram University Central Library: A Case Study by R. K. Ngurtinkhuma, Oliver Laithlengliana and R. Lalmangaihzuai. Most of the users use internet daily, which is a good mark showing that the awareness level of the researchers is not low. Majority of the students are aware about internet use before enrolling themselves in the university. The rate of internet use among the respondents is high but low use of internet from the university facility can show a negative sign. The conclusion of this session is that this is the digital age; we should change according to the changes of 21st century. For that purpose industry is ready to cope with. Accordingly they have changed their products to suit with the demand of modern time. They are ready to accept the challenges. As library professionals we should come ahead and face the challenges and get the new opportunities in this profession. On 3rd

day the first technical session was on theme expanding digital footprints through library consortium. The session was chaired by Dr. R. K. Sharma, United Nations Information Centre. The plenary talk was delivered by Dr. Dinesh Tyagi, CEO, CSC E-Governance Services India Limited. Dr. Tyagi delivered very interesting and useful talk. He emphasized the Digital India programme of Union Government of India. He explained each and every aspect associated with the digital India programme in lucid way. He also correlated the libraries and library professional role in making the programme successful. Number of questions were posed during the programme and Dr. Tyagi answers every accurately to all queries raised by the audience. Numbers of papers were presented during the session on various topics viz. Digital library facilities, digital resources, crowd sourcing, intellectual property right, content evaluation etc. The second and third technical sessions on 28th October were merged and joint technical session was chaired by Dr. D. V. Singh, University Librarian, and Delhi University Library System. Numbers of papers were presented during the programme covering the theme e-books, e-resources services, bibliometric study, consortium, manuscript collect, and open source software, massive open online courses, big data etc. The session was very interesting and interactive.



4. Industry Connect Sessions

The industry connect session provided an opportunity to the audiences to know the products

information. During the conference 13 companies representatives demonstrated their products and services. On 26th October 2017 during first industry connect session the representatives from EBASCO demonstrated their product and services and in second industry connect session M/s Balani Infotech delivered talk explaining their product and services. On the same day during post lunch sessions M/s Elsevier and M/s Total Library Solutions representatives delivered their talk related to their online databases and resources. During the last industry connect session IndiaStat.com and GIST+ Bentham. In the second day the M/s China National Knowledge Infrastructure, M/s Cambridge University Press, M/s SAGE and M/s PROQUEST representatives delivered their talks. On 3rd day of the conference four industry connect sessions were organized wherein company executives of M/s Informatics India, M/s Int. Subscription Agency, M/s Taylor & Francis and M/s Indian Journal. Com interacted with the audiences. The industry connect sessions were very interactive and participants posed several questions to the corporate professionals. The organizers expressed their thanks to all the company representative giving memento to all speakers.

5. Workshops

Two workshops were organized during the conference 27th and 28th October 2017. First workshop was organized and sponsored by British Library London. The Director of the workshop was Dr. S. Majumdar, Librarian, India International Centre, New Delhi. The resource persons of the workshop were and Mr. Tom Derrick, Tom Derrick, Digital Curator, British Library, London (UK), Mr. Abhijit Bhattacharya, Centre for Studies in Social Sciences, Kolkata. The concept of organizing the workshop was that digitisation can increase access to collections, provide surrogates for vulnerable originals, enable virtual reunification of collections or reveal information not available to the naked eye. But how do you know where to start? What type of image should you create, what equipment do you need, how do you prepare items for digitisation? The workshop covered the practical aspects of undertaking digitisation. It also focused on the digitisation of library and archive materials, though the principles are transferable to other formats. Furthermore, the resource person covered the guidance on lifecycle of digitisation project planning, image specification and file formats, condition assessments, choosing equipment and file management. A case study of one of the British library's major digitisation projects, Two Centuries of Indian Print, was contextualized covering the various strands of digitization.

The second workshop was organized on theme Media & Information Literacy. The workshop was sponsored by UNESCO. The resource persons of the workshop were Prof. Jagtar Singh and Dr. Anup Kumar Das from Jawaharlala Nehru University, New Delhi. During the workshop various aspects of information generations were discussed. More than 50 participants attended the workshop. During the workshop participants were given assignments in 10 groups. Further, each group representative expressed the viewpoints of major highlights emerged after group discussion. Workshop was very interactive and participants thoroughly enjoyed the deliberations.

6. Policy Dialogue/Panel Discussion

First panel discussion was organized on first day on conference. The deliberation was on their developing a sustainable model for e-resources: issues and strategies. The motions of the discussion are libraries being overcharges by publishers. The following speakers expressed their views during the policy dialogue Dr. Ramesh Gaur, Mr. Saleem Anwar, Dr. Nabi Hasan, Dr. Akhtar Parvez, Dr. M. Madhusudhan, Dr. Sanjay Kataria, Mr. Kailash Balani, Mr. Shaji John and Mr. Ravi Singh.



The policy dialogue session was very interactive and lively. Another policy dialogue namely The ASIALA Policy Dialogue # 2 was moderated by Dr. Gayas Makhdumi and rapporteur of the session was Mr. Johan M. Mir. The theme of the discussion was Google is a New Librarian: Saving Libraries for Museums. The speakers of the session were: Dr. Piya Rai,

NLU, New Delhi, Dr. Puja Anand Gulati, University of Delhi, Dr. Lata Suresh, Prof. A. P. Singh, BHU, Varanasi, Dr. Masoom Raza, AMU, Aligarh, Dr. Narender Kumar, University of Delhi, Dr. Raj Kumar Bhardwaj, St Stephen's College, Delhi, Dr. S.K. Senapati, CBRI, Roorkee. The session was moderated by Dr. Gayas Makhdumi, Former University Librarian, JMI. The session was started with the views presented by Dr. Lata Suresh, Indian Inst. of Corporate Affairs, Gurgaon. She emphasized that its human who created Google nor Google created human being. Google contains very much information but finding precise information is a crucial task. She said that in

U.S. the librarian is known as human Google. The second speaker of the dialogue process initiated by Dr. Priya Rai, Dy. Librarian, National Law University, Delhi. She said that being a developing country, our focus should be on providing better services using various tools and services. She said that when open courses like MOOCs could not replace teachers then how Google can replace libraries. Google is just the supplement of libraries not the substitute. Prof. A.P. Singh, BHU also questioned the authenticity and reliability of Google's contents. He stated that Google provides only links to scholarly journals not the full-text information. Prof. Masoom Raza from AMU also supported in favour of Libraries. He pointed that Google and libraries both works in co-existence. Libraries should use Google and other value added services to meet the users need. Dr. Narendra Kumar, Dy. Librarian, University of Delhi also pointed out that libraries serve as an archival house. He explained that online information/website has only 90 days average life span. He gave examples of British Library who have been spending millions of pounds to archive the present websites. Furthermore, in Indian context Google has very less contents on vernacular languages. In this situation libraries would serve as a long serving institution than Google.

Dr. Raj Kumar Bhardwaj, Librarian of St. Stephen College mentioned that Google is empowering us not replacing us. He further added that computers are generating carbon-footprints than physical libraries. Dr. Puja Anand Gulati, Librarian of Shaheed Bhagat Singh College, University of Delhi said that Google provides the global services whereas libraries and librarians provide the individualistic service. She agreed upon the notion that both Google and Libraries co-exist together rather as substitute. In the concluding dialogue, Dr. S.K. Senapati, CBRI Roorkee said that quantity can never replace quality. Google has plethora of information which needs when intervention in form of librarians to filter the precise information. He said that librarians are still the best available resource in form of

quality contents.



The 3rd policy dialogue session was organized on 28th October 2017. The session was moderated by Prof. P. B. Mangala, Tagore Fellow & former Dean and Head, Department of Library and Information Science, University of Delhi. The agenda of the dialogue was: Vision 2050: A mid-century review of new trends in LIS resources and services. The speakers namely Dr. D. V. Singh, Dr. P. R. Goswami, Dr. Shantnu Ganguly, Dr. Sushmita Das, Dr. Sushant Kumar Senapati expressed their opinions during the deliberations. It was very lively dialogue and audience given good feedback about the outcome emerged after discussion.

7. Exhibitions

In the conference 9 exhibitors displayed their products in stall during the exhibition. The exhibition was inaugurated by Prof. Talat Ahmad, Hon'ble Vice Chancellor, Jamia Millia Islamia, New Delhi. Prof. Ahmad visited each stall in the exhibition and interacted with the exhibitions. Exhibitors also organized lucky draw to attract the delegates. Each stall was very well organized. The exhibition was one of the highlight of the conference. Several dignitaries were present during the inauguration.



8. Recommendations

Following recommendations were made during the conference:

1. Develop guidelines for interoperability and sustainability of institutional repositories to

- foster interdisciplinary and cross campus research;
- II. The Government should allocate sufficient funds to public libraries to acquire the latest information resources and upgrade their ICT equipments and facilities;
 - III. Some of the key concerns are organizational more than directly related to technology. Any initiatives or services should be driven by needs of the organizations involved rather than by the technology. Cloud computing may provide a means of deploying services at lower costs and with higher impact than with locally based services, but it is not in itself the strategic driver. It seems important to identify or create an organization that has the recognized authority to be able to coordinate the activities that would be deployed as cloud-based services. Further investigation should be given to the role of INFLIBNET, its existing services, and any new services that it might be able to support on behalf of the collective body of academic library.
 - IV. The first priority should be the identifying collaborative services that are needed on their own merits and consistent with the ongoing development of the academic library community in India. Are these libraries ready to collaborate to establish centralized services? If so, what are the services that would provide the most benefit to academic libraries? Candidates might include:(a)a comprehensive bibliographic repositories in support of cataloging and resource sharing. (b) Knowledge bases in support of e-resource management centered on the research and scholarship of Indian universities and research organizations. Such an initiative might be similar to the Knowledge Base+ project underway in the United Kingdom
 - V. A national body (like the INFLIBNET) in India should be responsible for (a)formulating regulations, policies, best practice guidelines, etc.(b).Provision and implementation of cloud framework and services conducting research and training(c).developing standards, protocols, etc.
 - VI. Online discovery content across all the academic libraries(a) Full implementation of union catalogue of academic libraries(b) Shared union catalogue with other libraries
 - VII. GOI should continue with the ESS consortium and its resources so that academic community can get sufficient e-resources to conduct teaching, learning and research.
 - VIII. Libraries should expand its services and digital footprints by managing the research data in their institutions;
 - IX. Sufficient funds should be allocated to the libraries of universities and research institutions to start research data management services.
 - X. The realisation of efficient OCR solutions for Indian scripts has the power to transform

research through the application of natural language processing techniques to machine readable full text. This an area of our sector that requires more attention, and there is promising work being undertaken in India and beyond involving machine learning, LSTM and pattern recognition techniques.

- XI. An agency like INFLIBNET should formulate guidelines and standards to manage the research data in Indian Universities and research institutions.
- XII. Funding agencies ought to allocate sufficient funds for research projects to foster research and development activities in library and Information science.
- XIII. The curriculum of Library and information science programmes should be revised keeping view the latest development in ICT.

In the end, Rapporteur General Dr. Raj Kumar Bhardwaj expresse heartfelt thanks to all the rapporteurs of the sessions for their immense contribution otherwise this would not have been possible to prepare and present this report.

3rd International conference of Asian Libraries, Building Smart Libraries: Changes, Challenges, Issues & Strategies August 6 –8, 2018, Organized by the Central University of Kashmir & Asian Library Association Srinagar, Kashmir, 190015, J&K, India

The 3rd International conference of Asian Libraries organized during August 6-8, 2018 at Nowgan Campus of the CUK, is third in series, after first one organized at IIM Indore and the second one at Jamia Millia Islamia which were equally successful events.

debate, deliberations and discussion during this one day seminar. Stalwarts of LIS profession dealt with issues and offered wide ranging opinions and views.



3. Libraries ought to help in dissemination of various schemes and programmes to the Government so that maximum members can be benefited.
4. Libraries also ought to play crucial role in skill development through various events.
5. GOI and private players under corporate social responsibilities should set up rural libraries in large number for overall socio, cultural and economic development of society.

6. Library and information science professionals must discuss, debate, and develop strategies to transfer libraries into nerve centres of socio economic development.
7. The thin line between public and academic libraries should be diminished further for the benefits of the society.
8. GOI should implement National Knowledge Commission recommendations on libraries without any delay.
9. Data management work should be adopted by all types of libraries so that data can be reused, repurposed in further research. Subsequently, data management can help in avoid duplication of research and socio, cultural and economic development.
10. Libraries should be nodal centre for start-up India programme so that maximum people



can take benefit of this programme.

11. LIS schools should expand their curriculum keeping in mind the varied technological solutions in the digital age. Different pedagogy ought to be developed to transform the competencies of new entrants in the profession.

**Online International Conference of Asian Libraries 2020 Changing Information
Landscape: Rediscovering Libraries December 13-14, 2020**

The overall purpose of conference was to examine the impact of changing information landscape on library services and to explore libraries as a broad foundation for interaction with information and information management in a digital environment. It is being argued that libraries need to repurpose their services and rediscover their essence to meet the challenge by the emerging information landscape.

Dr. Sanjeev Kumar, Director, NRC, NIFT, New Delhi * General Secretary , Asian Library Association, welcomed the dignitaries and the participants to this conference. He mentioned how virtual meetings have changed the lifestyle of the LIS professionals globally in the present and ICAL 2020 is going to discuss the changing role of libraries during the pandemic.

Mr. Sanjay Bihani, a Member of the IFLA governing board explained the function, role and activities of IFLA. The President of IFLA also addressed the participants. She mentioned the need of changing the role of LIS professionals in the pandemic. The chief guest of the conference, Dr.A. P. Singh, DG-RRRLF, Kolkata delivered his keynote address. He recalled Dr. S. R. Ranganathan and his 5 laws and expressed changing the role of LIS professionals to serve the user perfectly in the pandemic.

Dr. Shabhat Husain, Ex-head, Dean, University librarian, AMU, Aligarh stated that Asian Library Association is doing an excellent job by conducting this conference in the pandemic. At the end of the inaugural session, Dr. Rajkumar Bhardwaj, St. Stephens College, Delhi University gave the vote of thanks and captured the essence of the session .

The 4th technical session was chaired by Mrs. Kala Anjan Dutta, former director of the American central library. In this session, Dr. Shantanu Ganguly, Chief Librarian, AIIMS, New Delhi delivered an invited talk on the topic “Application of knowledge mapping technique in knowledge management: A health care services perspective”. In this session, 3 papers and 2 product presentations were presented. 5th technical session was chaired by Dr. A. M. Baba, University Librarian, Central University of Kashmir. Two Invited Talks were delivered by Dr. P. R. Goswami, former director of ICSSR, New Delhi and Dr. Rama Patnaik, IIM, Bengaluru on the topics “structure of social science information” and “Repurposing library spaces for the future: an experience in IIMB library”. Nine papers were presented by the participants in this technical session.

During the conference, it was concurred by speakers that the global information landscape is undergoing a massive transformation. Most of the information is today accessible online in a 24x7 format. The universal availability of smart phones and affordable Internet has brought information at the doorstep of the masses. A large amount of scholarly communication is also available freely from open access journals and information gateways, strongly supported by research community. This free flow of information has almost eliminated the monopoly of libraries over information and a host of competing platforms have emerged as source of credible and peer reviewed information. This has led to a massive debate in the academic world with regard to an urgent need on the part of libraries to diversify into new areas of information management. Consequently libraries are in the process of readying themselves to meet this survival battle with new tools and ideas and provide services, traditionally unknown.

Modern technologies, it is argued in one of the papers , will be of staggering help to libraries towards fortifying their relationship and giving overhauled customer arranged organizations to existing customers. Libraries need to advance an endeavor to offer this sorts of help through cell phones. Besides, it will help libraries toward building incredible relationship and offering better sorts of help to their present far off customers. Author advocates the

utilization and use of portable innovation in the libraries, their focal points, versatile applications and library administrations through portable innovation.

It was further argued that digital technologies have overcome traditional barriers and have opened up new ways of reading, communication, interaction, participation, and access to information for differently-abled people. Now, the visually impaired can access computer programs, the Internet, and digital resources using Braille displays, screen magnifying monitors, screen readers, and speech synthesis. These electronic aids are collectively called as Assistive or Adaptive Technology. Innovative practices bridge the gap between the library and the users for maximum utilisation of the resources. Implementing cutting edge technologies like Remote login facilities, Citation databases, International subject-based databases, and online user training programs are some of the best examples of adapting to new environment.

It was argued that libraries are growing slow and steadily since their inception. Today libraries are transforming their role remarkably from the custodian of traditional information resources to the provider of service oriented digital information/ web information resources, as a result of which libraries are now on cloud. Emergence of libraries with different nomenclatures operating in the universe of knowledge, libraries are being termed as traditional, automated, electronic, digital and virtual and hybrid. In the web environment a new interactive concept of Library2.0 has emerged. All these libraries are using different information technology applications for performing activities ranging from acquisition of materials to the dissemination of information.

As e-learning policy assumes a more significant role within the context of education policy of governments and autonomous institutes of national importance, the quality improvement in library services is essential not only for their survivals but also for facing the major changes and challenges of 21st century. As a result libraries are undergoing rapid changes. Consequently, today, the most popular ICT based library services in higher educational institutions are associated with e-learning. It is all due to the fundamental and structural changes within organizations and drastic changes in the way e-content and e-learning materials are delivered to students and faculty in the global market with the help of libraries.

According to several presenters, the advantages of the new emerging technologies in delivering distance services are obvious. Libraries are able to offer their users far more

options and avenues. This in turn, provides convenience, eliminates barriers of distance and isolations, saves the users time, streamlines procedures and document delivery, and makes communication easier.

As librarian must be prepared to handle these emerging e-challenges, they have to developed their expertise and resources and infrastructure to handle these emerging technologies. In this way they can convince their administrator that the library has the tools, expertise, and resources to serve distance users and distance learners. This conference upfront all these issues in the context of global pandemic and long closure of access to libraries physically.

We hope that this conference will help to understand some of the issues involved in this transformation and also add value to existing LIS literature.

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

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
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
